**Re: Pensacola Hydroelectric Project (FERC No. 1494-438)
Request for Extension of Time to File Additional Information**

Dear Secretary Bose:

On March 14, 2023, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (Commission or FERC) staff issued its Determination on Requests for Study Modifications and New Studies (Determination) for the Grand River Dam Authority's (GRDA) Pensacola Hydroelectric Project, FERC No. 1494 (Project).¹ FERC staff's Determination provides that GRDA is to complete additional runs of its Hydrologic and Hydraulic (H&H) Modeling Study and its Sediment Transport Modeling (STM) Study, and use those results to respond to staff's Determination within 30 days, or by Thursday, April 13, 2023.

After reviewing the information requested in the Determination, GRDA's technical consultants determined that they need significantly more time to develop the information requested in the Determination. For the good cause demonstrated herein,² GRDA respectfully requests an additional 100 days to respond to staff's Determination, so that it would file its response by Monday, July 24, 2023.

a. H&H Modeling

The Determination requested GRDA to conduct additional modeling runs for the “extreme” circumstance in which the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (“Corps”) would deviate from its Water Control Manual, such that “the initial starting elevation remains steady until the arrival of flood flows as recommended by the City [of Miami],” i.e., until the flood flows reach Pensacola Dam.³ The Commission’s study plan determinations throughout this relicensing effort have directed GRDA to utilize the Corps’ RiverWare model. Therefore, GRDA’s Flood Routing Model (FRM) and Operations Model (OM) were never constructed to deviate so dramatically from predicted Corps operations, which are prescribed by its 1992 Updated Water Control Manual. Rather, the FRM and OM were developed with the goal of validating them against the Corp’s RiverWare model, as required by the Commission. For this reason, GRDA will need to re-architect the FRM and OM to meet the requirements of Commission staff’s Determination. This will require GRDA to complete the OM simulations, then post-process the OM results for input into HEC-RAS. The estimated time to complete this work is 20 working days.

The Upstream Hydraulic Model (UHM) simulation times, while less than the Sediment Transport Model (STM) simulation times discussed below, are substantial. A single simulation takes anywhere from one to four hours to complete. Assuming an average run time of two hours, running the first iteration of operation alternatives will take over 140 hours, or nearly 18 working days. Moreover, each simulation will need to be run twice, which is the bare minimum needed for troubleshooting, requiring a total of 36 working days for simulations. Mead & Hunt, GRDA’s technical consultant, intends to use parallel computing to the extent possible, but completing the work required by FERC’s Determination will still require significant monitoring and effort by the modeling team.

Finally, post-processing the Hydrologic Engineering Center’s River Analysis System (HEC-RAS) results for presentation and analysis will take a substantial amount of time. For example, over 9,300 individual hydrographs must be extracted from the simulations, imported into Excel for analysis, and checked. This process was performed in support of the USR and must be performed again to address Commission staff’s request in the Determination. The estimated time to complete this work is 10 working days.

After HEC-RAS results are post-processed, exported, and checked, Mead & Hunt will develop new report materials, including new figures, new report text, and new report appendices. The report appendices, in particular, will take a substantial amount of time to create. Following development of all relevant materials, Mead & Hunt will develop a draft report and begin coordination with GRDA to ensure the materials meet GRDA’s standards. This will include multiple rounds of review

and final technical editing of all documentation. The estimated time to complete this work is 22 working days.

In total, GRDA estimates that responding to the additional information requested by Commission staff associated with the H&H modeling work will require approximately 88 working days, which do not include weekends and holidays. Based on this calculation and using the day after Commission staff's issuance of the Determination as day 1, GRDA anticipates that it can complete this effort by approximately July 18, 2023. The request to extend the deadline until July 24, 2023, provides some buffer time to address unforeseen circumstances that may arise.

b. STM Modeling

The Determination requested GRDA to "revise the downstream boundary condition for Tar Creek at the Neosho River confluence to reflect a flatter friction slope (if normal depth is used) or use a different downstream boundary condition, as appropriate."⁴ Completing this request will require modification of the model, simulation of the system, post-processing of the results, and evaluation of the efficacy of the changes to address water level differences at the Tar Creek and Neosho River confluence. This process may require several iterations to adequately address concerns at the confluence, evaluating several potential solutions. During this process, it is also possible that changes to the STM will cause instabilities, leading to model crashes and a need for evaluation of the issue, correction, and re-running the model.

The requested modifications cannot be completed in 30 days because the STM requires significant time to run. A stable simulation of a 50-year period takes between 12 and 20 hours of computation time, followed by additional time to process the results and determine whether iterative simulations using the OM are required. In the study as presented in the September 2022 USR, the STM simulated a 50-year period, results were processed, stage-storage curves were provided to the OM, and the OM provided new water level inputs for the STM. The STM was then re-run with the updated water levels, outputs were processed, and predicted geometry was provided for simulation in the 1D UHM. After simulating the July 2007 and 100-year events at multiple starting reservoir pool levels, those outputs were then processed and reported. This is a multi-day process that may be required for each of the four scenarios presented in the USR.

GRDA's consultant, AnchorQEA, assumes that each simulation will be run twice to account for troubleshooting. When revision of the Tar Creek confluence, testing, troubleshooting, and final simulation time are all considered, this work will require approximately 53 working days. Anchor QEA and the sediment team intend to use parallel computing to the extent possible, but

completing the work required by FERC's Determination will still require significant monitoring and effort by the modeling team.

Post-processing the data will also be a time-intensive process. For each scenario, several figures and tables must be produced to show, for example, water level outputs and sedimentation profiles. Stage-storage curves will be re-computed for each STM scenario, and OM water level predictions need to be provided in a format suitable for STM inputs. STM geometry file outputs will be reviewed, and the geometry will then be incorporated into the 1D UHM for further analysis. Water level outputs from the 1D UHM then will be converted to water surface profile plots for inclusion in the updated report. Each of these outputs must be reviewed for accuracy and properly formatted for inclusion in the updated report materials. The estimated time to complete this work is 10 working days.

Following development of all relevant materials, the sediment team will develop a draft report and begin coordination with GRDA to ensure the materials meet GRDA's standards. This will include multiple rounds of review and final technical editing of all documentation. The estimated time to complete this work is 22 working days.

In total, GRDA estimates that responding to the additional information requested by Commission staff associated with the STM model will require approximately 85 working days. Based on this calculation and using the day after Commission staff's issuance of the Determination as day 1, GRDA anticipates that it can complete this effort by approximately July 13, 2023. The request to extend the deadline until July 24, 2023, provides some buffer time to address unforeseen circumstances that may arise.
